

Masterton Primary School News

It's been a strange few months in any school. During January and most of February, there were only the children of keyworkers in the school. This made the school a very quiet place indeed. Although there was some very heavy snow during this time we succeeded in keeping the building open the whole time.

Despite the school being shut to most pupils we tried to keep things going as normal as possible and followed the school calendar, including having our annual Scottish Poetry Competition in February.

All pupils learned a Scottish poem and then recited it to their class teachers. The teachers then selected the winners from each class and the P.4-7 pupils performed their poems virtually. The judges found selecting a winner more difficult than in previous years. The standard was very high but we finally selected the following winners:

1st Cainnech Dall - P.6

2nd Grace Sinclair - P.4/5

3rd Noah Fairman - P.4/5

The winners performed their poems live at the TEAMS assembly later that week. Well done to everyone who made the effort to learn and recite their poems!

During lockdown we also had a whole school storytime held on a Monday, Wednesday and Friday on Microsoft TEAMS. We regularly had in excess of 150 pupils join us to hear the timeless classic story of 'The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe'. It was great fun and the children really seemed to enjoy it.

There was also a weekly assembly covering a variety of different topics. This was attended by up to 250 pupils. We were surprised that so many pupils were online at the same time but it was an excellent way of keeping in contact.

Since the 22nd February the P.1-3 pupils have returned to school and this has been great!

By the time you read this all the children should have returned to school. Term 4 promises to be extremely busy with lots to do including the Masterton Mile and Sports Day. We are really looking forward to this.

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Seagulls

Removal of Nesting Seagulls

Seagulls can be a real nuisance - causing damage to your property, being noisy, creating mess and health risks from their droppings and during the breeding season, they can become aggressive and attack people and pets if they feel threatened.

The Community Council and Councillor James Calder received several messages last year about issues with nesting seagulls in the Pitcorthie area. Cllr Calder has subsequently spoken to Fife Pest Control Services about what could be done in the area to combat this matter.

Before any measures can be taken to remove the birds, please note that seagulls are protected by law. Although many complaints have been submitted to Fife Council, the Council has no statutory duty to take action against gulls.

Fife Pest Control Services have told us that if they are called out, the nest will be removed and the customer will get a free second visit if gulls start to rebuild their nest which does happen if the nest is removed too soon.

Seagulls are very territorial, especially when it comes to areas that harbour safety for their nests. If the birds are left undisturbed throughout a season, they will come back around to the same spot year after year to build their nests all over again. Spiking can be put in place but seagulls are smart and will often return and stack sticks on top of spiking to renest on it plus it's costly and not always needed. Nest removal should see them gone and not return the following year.

The cost to remove a nest would be £90 per home affected, unless access onto roof is very restricted and if a cherry picker is needed then the cost would increase to cover this but in most cases a ladder / roofing ladder access is usually sufficient.

Anyone who presents this newsletter with their services mentioned in it will only have to pay £80 instead of £90 and for those who do not receive the newsletter, there will be an online edition on our website to access.

In the meantime, we strongly urge people to stop feeding seagulls because as long as that continues, they will keep coming to nest in the area. If anyone has any questions, please get in touch with us via Facebook or email: sdcc2014@outlook.com.





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Local Action

2 years and going strong!

Save the Calais Woods Wildlife campaign has now been going for over two years and continues to grow from strength to strength.

What started out as 1 man and his dog has now morphed into a fully active and constituted group of around 20 members with nearly 20 more supporting and helping out when they can, and that's not even counting the number of followers we have sharing our posts and events on social media and through word of mouth.

The campaign success has been built on the desire in and around the local community to ensure that any future developments in the area do not harm our beloved woodland and wildlife, as difficult a task as that may seem. But we can assure you that the commitment and effort our members have been putting into the campaign so far has been inspiring to see and just seems to make more people want to join in and play their part.

Through our campaign we have managed to muster several hundred people to contribute and have their say too:

- Shepherd site (phasing of housing)
 150 objections: Approved
 - 130 objections. Approved
- McDonalds 184 objections: Approved
- Axis Point (industrial est)
 586 objections: TBC
- Halbeath Masterplan (phasing)
 86 objections: TBC
- Approach road (calais wood north)

- 270 objections: TBC

Not great so far in terms of preventing anything, but fantastic in terms of people participating, and please don't get us wrong, we fully support an education facility next to the woods but parts of it like a new road and a petrol station just don't sit right.

We do have a monumental task at hand as we are challenging and questioning developments on 5 fronts, but we have and are making great headway and this will continue as long as you continue to support and help us when and if you can.

A Potted History of Pitreavie (Part 2)

The Battle of Pitreavie, also known as the Second Battle of Inverkeithing, is significant as the final battle within Scotland during the Wars of the Three Kingdoms. It brought Scotland within complete control of the Protectorate of Oliver Cromwell.

Cromwell invaded Scotland in July 1650; after a period of unproductive manoeuvring, he inflicted a heavy defeat on the Scottish army under David Leslie at Dunbar on September 3, 1650. However, Cromwell was still blocked by Leslie and unable to advance further.

He realised that Fife was the key to outflanking Leslie, and prepared for a sea-borne assault on North Queensferry. On the night of July 16/17, 1651, Colonel Overton led around 2,000 men to a landing on the north shore of the Forth, possibly at Inverkeithing Bay or Port Laing; by July 20, the Parliamentarian force numbered around 4,500 men.

After a cavalry action that saw losses on both sides, the Scottish infantry retreated north towards Pitreavie Castle. At Pitreavie, the infantry made a final stand on the sloping grounds but were overwhelmed by the more experienced Parliamentarians who had the additional advantage of cavalry. The Scots suffered more than 800 losses, including many prisoners.

Sir Hector Maclean of Duart, the 18th chief of Clan Maclean and 2nd Baronet of Morvern, was in command of the Highland soldiers during the battle. He and his father had fought for Montrose in 1645, and Maclean now found himself allied with his former enemies against Cromwell.

He was killed in the battle, and one of the two war cries of the Macleans dates from the battle: "Fear eile airson Eachuinn!". This is a reference to seven brothers who are supposed to have shouted this, which translates as "Another for Hector", as each in turn stepped forward to protect their clan chief. All seven of the brothers were killed, and Hector died with them near Pitreavie Castle.

The Pitreavie estate was once owned by Lady Christina Bruce, sister of Robert the Bruce, in the 14th century, and was purchased by Henry Wardlaw of Balmule, Chamberlain to Queen Anne of Denmark, in 1608.

He was knighted in 1613 and created a baronet of Nova Scotia in 1631. It would appear (especially given the initials over the main entrance of the original block) that the house was built for him.

By the early 18th century the house had passed into the possession of the Blackwood family. It had lain empty for many years when it was purchased in 1884 by Henry Beveridge (of St Leonard's Works fame).

In 1938, Pitreavie Castle was purchased by the Air Ministry and became the headquarters of 18 Group Coastal Command as RAF/MHQ Pitreavie. It remained in use by the MoD until 1996 - with its very own underground bunker - following which the estate was sold for development.

The finished castle comprises two principal two-storey homes and four single-storey apartments, two of which are available to rent through Airbnb.

Dog Fouling

We have received several complaints about dog fouling in the Pitcorthie area and the amount of dog poo on the pavements is disgusting!

Dog owners have a legal duty to clean up every time their dog fouls in a public place.

It is an offence if you do not clean up after your dog and may result in a fixed penalty notice of £80. It is an offence not to provide your name and address to the officer when asked and it could result in a fine of £500.

If the fines are not paid it may be referred to sheriff officers who will recover payment from you which will also include their fees. If the matter is not referred to sheriff officers, it will be sent to the procurator fiscal.

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Making Your Will

Have you made your will?

If you don't have a will, is it because:-

- It is something you have put off until tomorrow?
- You have swept the idea under the carpet to look at, at some unknown future date?

If you fall into either of these categories, you are not alone. It is a sad fact that more than half of us never get around to making a will.

Not making a will can create problems for the people you leave behind when you die such as:

- The wrong people may inherit your estate
- Your estate may take longer to settle without a will
- If you die without a will (Intestate) under Scottish law, your estate could be divided between distant relatives that you have had little contact with
- Family fallouts may result if you do not have a will as some family members may feel that they are not getting a fair share of your estate Finally, if you do have a will, is it up to date? An outdated will is as bad as not having a will at all!

Make your wishes known to avoid any future problems arising on your death.

Power of Attorney

Your family is powerless to help you without a Power of Attorney.

A Power of Attorney is a legal document that enables your family to help you by allowing them to speak on your behalf to doctors, social workers or hospitals to give you assistance with welfare matters.

A Power of Attorney also gives authority for your loved ones to help you with legal matters such as banking.

Of course, you establish a Power of Attorney hoping that you never have to use it. We all hope that we will be as independent as possible as we age.

However, no one knows what is ahead. Situations such as when you have a stroke may mean that you need the help of your relatives or friends urgently and this is where having a Power of Attorney is extremely important.

New confidentiality rules introduced in 2020 means doctors, social workers and banks will not include your family members in any decision making unless they have a Power of Attorney for you.

Do not leave establishing a Power of Attorney until you are incapacitated. Appointing a Power of Attorney when you are fit and well will offer peace of mind for you and your family.

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Growing Generously

Growing Generously started in 2019, when I moved to Scotland. I wanted to find a way to help people over the Christmas period and therefore asked the members of the community if they would be interested wrapping presents together for the care homes in Fife.

The response was incredible which led to our first event in December 2019, which Sandra our first volunteer helped to organise and since then her amazing family continue to support our projects.

Our first event was held in Dalgety Bay at the Parish Church. Over 100 presents were wrapped by families and then delivered to two care homes by a small group of children.

I will never forget the look on the residents' faces when they received the presents from the children, their faces lit up, that was when I knew we can do so much more!

Since working in childcare for five years I have seen how much children love to help, whether shopping for food, wrapping a present or writing a card to someone they can do it in a small way. I believe we should create opportunities for children and their family to give and help others.

Since then, we have donated over 80 food hampers to Fife Women's Aid, have launched our new homeless project to hand out blessing bags to those sleeping rough and we plan to continue to run projects and community events to support charities and other organisations.

We hope to inspire children to grow up helping others in the future.

We also aim to build a relationship with care homes in Fife so the children can continue to connect with the residents when it is safe to do so.

Our vision is to see families and their children come together to make a positive difference in people's lives through fun and creative events!

We may be only a team of 3 but with a generous community and amazing volunteers (Sandra and Thana), I believe we can make a positive impact.

Local Support

Food for Your Future - Community Pantry

Who are we?

We are a community group of 6 volunteers who run a Community Pantry from The Tryst Centre in Abbeyview.

The Pantry started in February 2020 after 5 pilot sessions were held in 2019 where we engaged with community residents in all areas of Dunfermline. The reason for these pilots were to gauge the interest and requirement for this kind of project.

The results spoke for themselves.

Christmas 2019, we held two free Festive Meal events. A three-course meal all cooked with food that was destined for landfill, but was perfectly edible. Over the 2 events, we served more than 170 people. They also had the opportunity to attend our pop-up pantry at the end of the evening where they could select a minimum of 10 items.

We are committed to reducing the amount of food waste sent to landfill but also giving families and individuals a dignified source of safe, nutritious food at a fraction of the cost. People can sign up as a member, pay £2 per week to select a minimum of 10 food items. The food items include ambient, fresh, chilled, frozen, bakery and fruit and vegetables.



How do we source our food?

We have partnered with many different organisations and supermarkets to allow us to source food at a reduced price or for free. We collect surplus stock from many different stores locally. Most of this food would have been sent to landfill but it is perfectly safe for consumption.

COVID

At the start of lockdown, we had a period of 3 weeks where the Pantry was closed due to the building being shut. We applied for funding to many different organisations and local groups. This would allow us to put the £2 fee on hold and offer families and individuals free pantry bags. The Pantry reopened on 16th April and we opened up to 5 communities in line with Fife Council Food Resilience Team. Procedures were put in place to keep volunteers and people collecting bags safe during these unsettling times. All volunteers were trained on a specific Risk Assessment for the reopening of the building under COVID guidelines.

What's in a bag?

Included in each bag is: soup, tinned meat/fish, vegetables, custard/rice pudding, tinned fruit, cereal, milk, pasta/rice, sauce/tinned tomatoes, a snack and a treat and sometimes a bottle of juice. We also add in chilled and frozen produce. This could be a packet of mince, steaks, chicken, sausages etc and also yoghurts, cheese, butter are also added (depending on availability). In addition to this ambient bag, we then make up a fruit and vegetable bag and a bakery bag for each person registered. These bags include all the surplus items we collect from supermarkets.

Mostly, all this surplus food fills 5 car boots. A huge amount, probably reaching 10s of 1000s of kgs.

Facts & Figures

Since April 16th 2020, a total of 3423 bags have been given out, reaching over 8000 people in total. But in actual fact, everyone goes away with 3 full bags of food. We have estimated that these bags would be enough to make at least 30 meals. So that's enough food given out for over 100,000 meals!

We give much thought to the nutritional content of the bags and hope to make sure they contain well balanced food items. We opened back up to the whole of Dunfermline in December 2020 due to the number of enquiries we were receiving outwith the original 5 communities.

We also partner with Fife Council and offer meals and/or packed lunches throughout school holidays. Again, this provision is open for anyone to access.

We continue to apply for funding as we don't yet really know the full economic impact that COVID has placed on community residents. We have pledged that we will continue to offer this free service for as long as required.

We are so grateful for all the support we receive from funders, donors, Fife Council to name a few. But the number of hours and dedication given to FFYF by the volunteers is astonishing (an approx. of 60 hours per week).

- Open: Mornings for 50 weeks of the year and afternoons during term time











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Consequences

The game 'Consequences' was popular when I was growing up. You fold-up a piece of paper and each friend writes a simple line for a story. You can't see what your friends wrote, or what nasty, funny or embarrassing consequences your friends are dreaming-up for their later lines in the story. Then comes the great reveal, when the story in its entirety is made visible to you and your friends. What simple pleasures!

But that's not the consequences I'm interested in this morning. I want to talk about the consequences of lockdown and the implications it has on us and our children. And there have been many.

And finally, thank goodness, making a new friend and having fun!

Because of lockdown, our children have missed out on a key part of their development and upbringing. But we shouldn't be too despondent. Children are incredibly resilient and adaptive and will quickly make up for lost time when they get the opportunity to learn, study and develop new relationships again. We should all be positive and optimistic. The sun is shining, we are coming out of lockdown and we are all going to make the most of it and make up for lost time.

Let's start by looking after ourselves and our health a bit more. It's amazing how a good haircut and colour can lift your spirits but you may also need help with stress and anxiety as a consequence of lockdown. No Bake Vanilla Cheese Cake

Ingredients:

150g digestive biscuits 50g butter 300g cream cheese 145g icing sugar 2 tsp lemon juice 450ml double cream 1 tsp vanilla extract 1 vanilla pod, scraped


Method

Make the base by crushing the digestive biscuits up into a powder, melt the butter and then mixing them together. Press into the bottom of a tin with a removable base, then put in the fridge to set.

Cheesecake mixture – mix the cream cheese, lemon juice and icing sugar in a bowl until smooth. Next whip the double cream with the vanilla extract and vanilla seeds to stiff peaks. Now mix the whipped cream and the cream cheese mixture together making sure that both mixes are fully combined.

Take the digestive base out of the fridge and spread the cheesecake mix over the top. Chill in the fridge for a minimum of 1 hour. Enjoy!


